Trade Career: A profession that involves skilled technical expertise or manual work in a specific trade. These careers often require specialized training, education, or apprenticeships but typically do not necessitate a four-year college degree.

Trade careers can include fields such as:

- Manufacturing (e.g. Print Production, Welders, Machine Operator)
- Healthcare (e.g. Dental Hygienists, Medical Technicians, Phlebotomist)
- Technical Services (e.g. Audio/Video Technician, IT support specialists, Cyber Security,)
- Culinary (e.g. Chef, Baker, Cake Decorator, Mixologist)
- Beauty / Personal Care (e.g. Cosmetologist, Esthetician, Fitness Trainer)
- Photography (e.g. Medical Photographer, Event Photographer)

Trade careers are vital to the economy, providing essential services and contributing to various industries. They often offer good job security, good wages, opportunities for advancements and entrepreneurship.
